Learn through personalized online Power Point Presentations with Gail Harker and Penny Peters, with discussions, **25 videos and a PDF workbook of 14 lessons**. Workbook pdfs and videos will be sent to students after each online session.

There is lots of information about fabrics, fabric painting, threads, needles, techniques and stitch diagrams. Special historical insights about some of the stitches have been developed particularly for this course.

Stitches in Class

Each of the stitched samples is detailed in Power Point Presentations and video.

- * A number of Stitches from major stitch groups will be learned in class.
- * Some stitch derivations will also be used.
- * Hand positions will be discussed for stitching without fabric in a hoop.
- * Some stitching myths will be dispelled with a focus being on the individuality of the stitcher and ease of stitching rather than a rigid formality of technique.

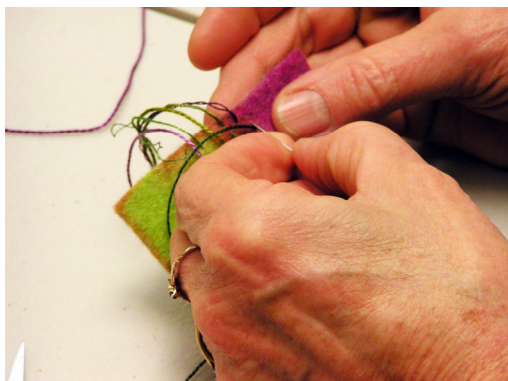
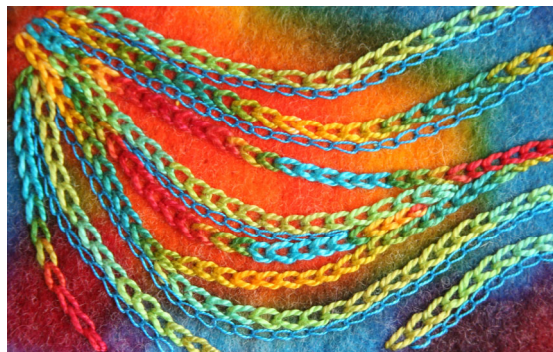

Paint Fabric Pages



The *Little Stitch Book* pages may be painted with Textile Paint. Students will be sent a very specific **Supply List** focusing on the fabric and paints to purchase. These things will all be demonstrated and discussed in detail in the class.

Students may make a choice whether to leave the fabrics unpainted or to Color them.



Make a Book from Embroidered Pages

In class we will learn to make a mockup of the actual book in white fabric. Students will then be able to use their prototype white sample and directions to follow up with the actual colored book pages when they are ready.



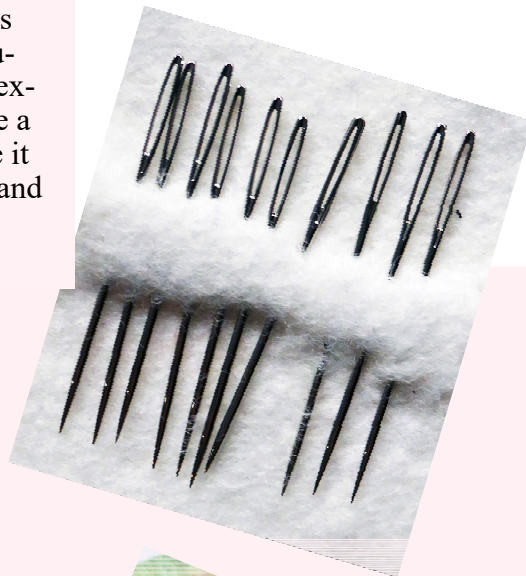

Online Level 1 Experimental Hand Little Stitch Book

Begin a binder to collect notes, instructions and your own personal documentation about materials tools and equipment.

Learn about needles, fabrics for this project, threads and other tools. Students will work through first hand experience to collect, name and create a thread chart for this project and use it for further personal understanding and use.

Summary of Session Activities:

- * Paint fabric for a small book
- * Cut fabric pages for a small book
- * Learn about Needles, Threads, Fabrics and other Tools and Equipment for this project
- * Make a Threads Chart
- * Learn a variety of stitches and variations for each page in the book
- * Stitch on colored pages during and after a class session
- * View historical and contemporary use of stitches in Power Point Presentations
- * Make a mockup of actual book in white with spine binding stitches in preparation for the *real thing*.
- * Finishing Touches - Attachment Stitches, Labels and other
- * Learn through online Power Point Presentations with Gail Harker - discussions, videos, pdf workbook. Workbook pdfs and videos will be sent to students after each online session.

Who This Course Is For: It has been designed for the beginner of stitch or for those who would like a refresher on traditional and new ideas and *how to work* with stitches.

Many of our students tell us that they find it a challenge to be able to describe to their friends what it is that they do on any particular course at our center. It's Never too Late

We work from basic patterns of nature, color, line shape and texture. Our conversations about colored fabrics and threads, the movement of the paint, how colors mix to create new colors, shades or neutrals are part of the dialogue that begins in this class. We color fabrics to get more than just *nice colors* but to begin to understand the messages that can be told through the medium of color itself. We stitch, not to recreate the perfect stitch but to create a line, mark or textural quality to express the essence of an idea, mood or thought.

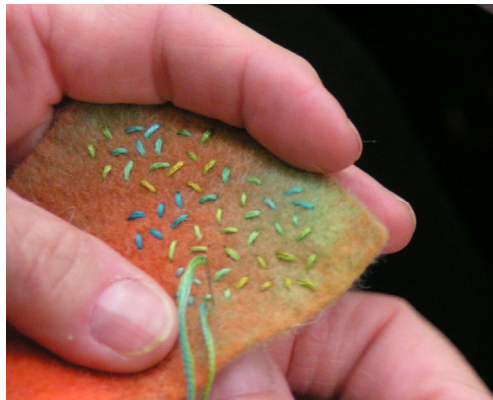
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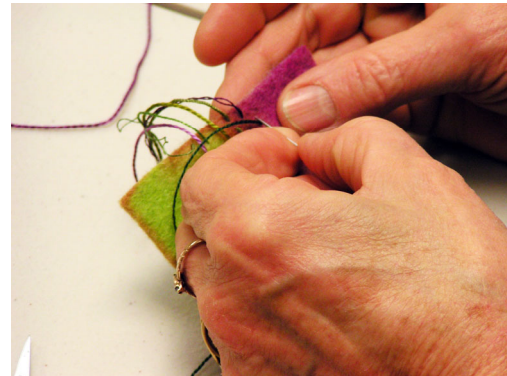
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The Tutor
