










Who is This Class Intended for ?

Unit 1 - Color Theory and Symbolic Associations

Unit 1 focuses on developing observational skills, renewing the way in which color is perceived, and how more information can be generated from what is seen.

Learning about historical associations and revealing your personal color associations will assist you to better analyze your attitude. It can help to identify strong dislikes or prejudices about color.

A clear picture of your personal color history will be created by studying each color in the spectrum in addition to white, black and neutrals, one by one. Being familiar with the deep seated impressions you have about color will prepare you to work with it in an informed and free manner.








Unit 2 - Color Mixing and Extended Color Theory








Unit 3 - Natural and Systematic Color Schemes
