
The Creative Experience

Many of our students tell us that they find it a challenge to be able to describe to their friends what it is that they do on any particular course at our center. I compiled this short visual presentation about Level 1 Experimental Hand Stitch for this very purpose. I hope that it will give you an idea of the aims, objectives and the accomplishments that students have within this five day course. Send it on to anyone who may enjoy looking at beautiful things.

It's Never too Late

We work from basic patterns of nature, color, line shape and texture. Our conversations about dyed fabrics and threads, the movement of the dye, how colors mix to create new colors, shades or neutrals are part of the dialogue that begins in this class. We dye fabrics and threads to get more than just *nice colors* but to begin to understand the messages that can be told through the medium of color itself. We stitch, not to recreate the perfect stitch but to create a line, mark or textural quality to express the essence of an idea, mood or thought. We are fuelled with the knowledge that it is never too late to create original work regardless of life circumstance.

There is also a section covering each of the samples and how to do the stitches. This workbook is full of original illustrations and colorful photographs. The student notes are only occasionally used as a reference in the classroom. They are really intended to be a reminder and reference for students working at home.

Dyeing Threads






Students typically dye threads and fabrics on the first day. How can an artist begin to create until a palette of colors has begun? Students dye luscious colors of threads for stitching.
