

Studies in Experimental Stitch and Multi-Media

Advanced Skills, Experimentation & Individuality

This course is designed to hone the basic skills learned at other levels, and to build upon them to develop more highly advanced embroidery and design skills. It is also aimed at the development of a more experimental technique and individual style of working. The artist/embroiderer will continue to learn about analytic process and become more confident in art/design and embroidery.

Students will design items of an advanced nature and develop a range of practical skills supported by a thorough knowledge of materials, techniques, and processes.





Students will:

- Build upon and extend the skills, knowledge, techniques and processes found in level Three Experimental Stitch in addition to Research for Art and Design Level Four
- Show that ideas for stitch/textile inspiration can be obtained from a range of sources and images within the Research for Design Theme
- Create a Portfolio of Four Themed Studies that emanate from the Research for Design Studies and Theme
- Develop and produce a set of design work for each of the *Two Finished items*. Select Final Designs from Sampling.
- Work with a high degree of independence, supported by a tutor.
- Agree all aspects with tutor

Finished Items

- 1. A Portfolio of Four Theme Studies
- 2. Any item chosen by the student
- 3. Large Scale Item that is/or exceeds 36 inches in any one direction Items may be made for a range of purposes: Gallery, domestic, theater, fashion, formal, informal, religious, ornament or other purpose.

A Portfolio of Four Themed Studies

Working within the students chosen theme, a portfolio of experimental samples will be developed using specialized materials and techniques. Students will produce innovative samples with relevant information, brief notes, diagrams, notes, drawings, photos etc.

1. Hand Stitch

An original set of stitches and those that originate with specific Embroidery Techniques

- **2. Machine Stitch -** Using the machine independently and together with hand stitches
- **3. Historical Inspired Stitch Studies** based on 16th, 17th C. Raised and Metal Work Techniques or others as relevant
- **4. Independent Mentored Study Project -** Students may choose an independent source of inspiration/technique guided by your tutor.

Four Themed Studies

- Each of the four themed studies will include small learning samples, a variety of experimental samples and a minimum of one Resolved Sample.
- Sketchbooks will be kept for each Themed Study that could include inspirational ideas, research including historical, contemporary, fabrics, threads, techniques, documentation, learning samples and exercises. They may also contain paper designs, drawings, color studies, thread and fabric studies/ collections.
- Documentation Students will photograph and record all aspects of textile artwork and *work in progress* for purpose of documentation and presentation.
- Different methods of Presentation that suit your individual theme may also be selected towards the completion of each Study

There will be a special study on combining hand and machine as well as Raised Embroidery, Needle Lace and unusual aspects of Metal Threads.

She was awarded the Senior Qualification of Licentiateship (LCGI) by the City & Guilds Institute. Gail has previously been a teacher of several City and Guilds Embroidery courses, and was, for several years, a City and Guilds External Verifier for various colleges in Great Britain. Since moving to the United States and for the past 25 years, she has taught and directed at the Arts Center she founded in Washington State. Students have participated in Certificate and Diploma Classes in Design and Embroidery from all parts of North America.


