


Students attend a 5-day session at the studio and begin to create 2 sketchbooks full of color exercises and to share the experience of color making.


Level 1 Experimental Hand Stitch Orange Blossoms



Level 1 Experimental Machine Stitch Lewisia

Students see fabrics as a source of imaginative artistic possibility in Level 1 Experimental Machine Stitch. Every type of fabric has a unique quality that lends itself to particular techniques. Understanding the characteristics of the fabrics, the machine and threads is as important to a textile artist as wood and its qualities are to a woodworking artist.







The class completed a portfolio of fourteen machine embroidered samples. Each sample featured a new technique or patterned effect. The piece shown above is stitched with an organic grid-like pattern. The line patterns made with machine stitches and burning reminded people of ancient patterns or some organic natural movement.

Kantha Embroidery -Seen Through Western Eyes

February 2011 Penny Peters and I hung a small exhibit of embroideries from India in the studio. Saris. shawls, clothing and cow horn covers were part of the colorful array of items that graced the walls and tables. Students studied the embroidery by drawing motifs from a particular item and made notes about the stitching. They studied the designs and patterns on the pieces as well. It was fun to make stitch studies to replicate some of the mark making done so freely with line and stitch. Students then designed a motif of their own to work in stitch. There are so many ways of using running and darning stitches to tell a story. So simple and at the same time so complex. Of course it is all seen through western eyes. Our study of the pieces would be understood differently than the people who actually made the embroideries. Our commonality is that we all have an appreciation of the beauty of stitch.

They created a portfolio of hand stitched samples, fashioned a machine embroidered book and binding of their own design. They attended seven sessions each of 5 day duration (277 instructional hours.) The final session culminated in an exhibition of their work.

Spring time is such an awakening of plant growth and color. These new colors, either in the landscape or in plants and flowers themselves help to remind me of Nature's color schemes. All of the theorists in the world could not have imagined such a panoply of riches. The **Wintergreen**, one of our Art and Design groups each walked into the classroom with a bit of nature and proceeded to make color studies with paints and colored pencils.







Students are eligible for Level 3 immediately after Level 1 Color Studies—no Level 2 exists. Each of 8 5-day sessions consists of new work in art and design. Students work with many media and learn how to design and develop themes of work.








Stumpwork Embroidery
